Here's a little story from history.

Back in 1517, the second largest collection of religious relics belonged to Fredrick the Wise of Wittenberg (the largest was in the Vatican). The inventory listed 17,443 items, including a thumb from St. Anne, a twig from Moses' burning bush, hay of the holy manger, and milk from the Virgin Mary. Money was paid by the people in those days in order to adore these relics and thus escape years in purgatory. A diligent and pious person who rendered appropriate devotion to each of these relics could merit 1,902,202 years worth of penance.

Once a year on All Saints' Day (Nov. I) Fredrick would display these relics in the Castle Church. Thousands of pilgrims flooded to visit the relics and receive the spiritual graces the relics offered.



Now imagine the night before this grand opening of the relic display, October 31, Martin Luther, a 34-year -old monk and professor, pressing through this crowd of pilgrims to post his *Ninety-Five Theses* on the doors of the same Castle Church filled with relics.

Many people thought they could attain salvation only through a life of good works. But Luther, in his Theses, says the opposite. "If you can purchase forgiveness, then why did Jesus need to suffer and die?" The Theses by Luther changed the theological conversation of the church, and brought forward the importance of repentance, that is, the certainty that (1) we are sinners (2) forgiven and rescued by Jesus.

This is what we remember and celebrate on Reformation Day: the clarity of Christ dyeing for sinners!

Follow up from Page 1: What Happened to all the Relics



A question comes up every time someone visits the famous Castle Church in Wittenberg, (where Luther posted the 95 Theses). What happened to all the relics? The church, in its present form, dates to 1885 when it was rebuilt after a fire. The interior was completely gutted. Previous to that, the church had been rebuilt after the terrible destruction of the Saxon war with the Prussians in 1760. In fact, one third of the city of Wittenberg had been destroyed at that time. Thus the interior of the church is far removed from the days of Luther.

Built around 1499 by Fredrich the Wise, it served as the university chapel and church. It functioned much like our seminary chapels do today. Before the Reformation the church boasted some 17 altars, and a foundation funded priests saying the private mass for deceased souls - probably round the clock.

In 1507 there were 82 shrines for relics. Two years later there were 104, with some 5005 bits of this or that sacred relic or saint. By 1520 there were 117 shrines and 19,013 relics.

By visiting and venerating a person could lesson his or her time in purgatory by over a million years. The iconoclast controversy which destroyed so much statuary etc., in Wittenberg in 1521, did not touch the Castle church collection (the church is part of a fortress, after all). After Fredrich the Wise died in 1525 the collection began to be removed. As late as 1546/1547 the reliquaries were sent to the electoral mint and melted down for the gold and silver to fund the Schmalcald war.




In this connection so many manifest lies and so much nonsense has been invented about the bones of dogs and horses that even the devil has laughed at such knavery. Even if there were some good in them, relics should long since have been condemned. They are neither commanded nor commended. They are utterly unnecessary and useless. Worst of all, however, is the claim that relics effect indulgences and the forgiveness of sin and that, like the Mass, etc., their use is a good work and a service to God.

"Luke the beloved physician greets you," writes St. Paul in his Letter to the Colossians. Each year on October 18, the Church takes note of and gratefully remembers Luke the Evangelist. His Gospel account of the life of Jesus and the history of the Early Christian Church, which he shares through the Book of the Acts of the Apostles, are as beloved as is their writer. Luke brings what he calls an "orderly account" of the life, death, resurrection, and ministry of Jesus and its urgent importance. Luke then follows it up with his singular account that profiles the work of Peter, John, Paul, and other apostles. In his carefully crafted manuscripts, we find faith-supporting history and are given an eyewitness account of God at

work for us. We thank God that by the working of the Holy Spirit, the message of St. Luke has reached us today!

As we give thanks to God for St. Luke, apostle and evangelist, we are reminded of the special blessing that the Gospel bears in his name is for us. There are many Scripture accounts of the words and works of Jesus (which are singular to Luke's Gospel, the longest of the four accounts) that tell of the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.


In the first two chapters, we have the most complete account of the birth of Jesus, as well as the accounts of the birth of John the Baptist, the Annunciation to Mary by the angel Gabriel, and the one precious insight we have into the youth of Jesus - the story of the boy Jesus in the temple at Jerusalem.

Luke fills his orderly account with parables of Jesus. Eighteen of these earthly stories with heavenly meanings are found in Luke's Gospel alone, including the parable of the lost sheep, the account of the Good Samaritan, and the parable of the prodigal son, which has been called "the Gospel within the Gospel." Luke underscores the importance of persistence in prayer and accentuates the importance of humility and service to others as part of the call to following Jesus.

Luke's Gospel is filled with special people, including women and children. And there are songs in his Gospel alone that have been sung in the Church in every century since Luke included them in his inspired writing. Because of Luke, we can echo the Magnificat, the Song of Mary, and sing the Nunc Dimittis, the song of blessing first spoken by the aged Simeon in the temple when he saw the baby Jesus and understood that Jesus was indeed the Savior of the world. And Luke records the Benedictus, the words of prophecy first spoken by Zechariah, the father of John the Baptist, words of blessing and gratefulness to God, which we now sing together.

The Bible book we know as the Acts of the Apostles (which we shall follow next year, also authored by St. Luke) serves as a companion book to his Gospel. These two volumes account for about 25 percent of the New Testament, which is more text than from any other writer. The Book of Acts continues Luke's orderly account of God's work, which begins with the announcement of the birth of Jesus, the Savior, and concludes with the announcement of that completed work of salvation by Paul in Rome about six decades later.

Through the written word from Luke, we hear our Lord calling us to be joyfully aware that the kingdom of God is at hand as we hear the good news proclaimed among us. Luke reports that "the Word of God increased and multiplied" (Acts 12:24). As a firsthand witness of that initial growth and writer whose words instruct and inspire us, Luke has brought a special blessing to the Church and to each of us.


Helping Hands




